4. Complete the proof of Theorem 6.4 in the textbook.
5. Review the proof of Theorem 5.26 and Example 6.8 in the textbook.
6. Let $f : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be defined by the formula

$$f(x) = \begin{cases} x^2, & x \in \mathbb{Q} \\ 0, & x \in \mathbb{R} \setminus \mathbb{Q}. \end{cases}$$

- (a) Use the $\epsilon - \delta$ definition of continuity to prove that f is *not* continuous at any point $c \neq 0$.
 - (b) Prove that f is differentiable at 0.
7. (a) Prove that the function $f : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ defined as

$$f(x) = \begin{cases} x^2 \sin(\frac{1}{x}), & x \neq 0 \\ 0, & x = 0 \end{cases}$$

is differentiable, and find the formula for f' .

- (b) Show that f' is discontinuous at 0. [Hint: Prove that there exists $\epsilon > 0$ and a sequence $(x_n)_{n=1}^{\infty}$ convergent to 0 such that $f'(x_n) \geq \epsilon$ for all $n \geq 1$.]
8. In this exercise you will prove the equivalence of differentiability and the existence of local linearization of a function. We begin with a little definition:
Given $\delta > 0$, a function $\varphi : (-\delta, \delta) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is said to be *little o of h* (denoted $\varphi \in o(h)$), when

$$\lim_{h \rightarrow 0} \frac{\varphi(h)}{h} \text{ exists and equals } 0.$$

- (a) Prove that a function $f : I \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ defined on a non-degenerate interval I is differentiable at a point $a \in I$ if and only if there exists a real number A and a function $\varphi \in o(h)$ such that

$$f(a + h) = f(a) + Ah + \varphi(h).$$

(The above equality means that, in a small neighbourhood of a , f is nearly indistinguishable from the linear function $f(a) + Ah$, called its local *linearization*.)

- (b) Assuming f is differentiable at $a \in I$, what is the exact value of the constant A above?
