3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

Description

An enriched version of Calculus 1000A/B. Basic set theory and an introduction to mathematical rigour. The precise definition of limit. Derivatives of exponential, logarithmic, rational trigonometric functions. L'Hospital's rule. The definite integral. Fundamental theorem of Calculus. Integration by substitution. Applications.

Course-level learning outcomes

1. Use set notation to express mathematical concepts and find the supremum and infimum of a set of real numbers.

- 2. Compute the limits of functions at a point or at infinity using methods of algebra, limit laws, and related concepts.
- 3. Define the notions of limit and continuity and be able to determine if a given function is continuous using limits or other theorems.
- 4. Explain the role of limits in the definition of derivatives and integrals, and how the ideas of continuity, differentiability, and integrability are related to one another.
- 5. Compute derivatives and integrals of various algebraic, trigonometric, exponential, and logarithmic functions.
- 6. Deduce properties of the graph of a function from its derivatives and apply these concepts to solve optimization problems.
- 7. Define the notion of definite integral, state the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus and apply them to calculate integrals and compute areas between curves.
