3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

This is an introductory course on elliptic curves. They are mathematical objects which play key roles in Wiles's proof of Fermat's Last Theorem, the Birch and Swinnerton-Dyer conjecture (a Millennium Prize Problem), and public-key cryptography. This course will provide foundations for understanding these roles. Topics to be covered include:

- basics of algebraic varieties and curves
- geometry of elliptic curves
- elliptic curves over finite fields

Topics to be covered if time and interest permit include:

elliptic curves over the complex numbers

elliptic curves over global fields

5. Methods of Evaluation

Grading Scheme and Assessment Dates

The overall course grade will be calculated as listed below:

Assignments (5) 10%
Midterm Test 30%
Presentation 20%
Final Exam 40%

There will be six exercise sets, each posted to OWL one week before it is due. The lowest mark will be dropped. The tentative deadlines are Sep 20, Oct 04, Oct 25, Nov 08, Nov 22, and Dec 06 at **5pm**. Submissions will be via <u>gradescope.ca</u>.

An in-class midterm exam is tentatively scheduled for Oct 29. The scope of the exam will be given (in class or on OWL) by Oct 22.

Each student should prepare a 25-minute presentation to deliver in-class the last week of classes. A rubric for the presentation and a list of possible topics will be posted to OWL after the midterm. Students should select a topic and seek approval by Nov 19.

Evaluation Scheme for Missed Assessments

Students who miss the midterm exam and present supporting documentation will be given an opportunity to write a make-up exam tentatively scheduled for Nov 5. If the student misses this opportunity and has supporting documentation, the weight of the midterm will be shifted to the final exam.

When a student misses the Final Exam and their Academic Consideration has been granted, they will be allowed to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam). See the Academic Calendar for details (under <u>Special Examinations</u>), especially for those who miss multiple final exams within one examination period.

Coursework with Assessment Flexibility

By policy, instructors may deny Academic Consideration requests for the following assessments with built-in flexibility:

Assignments. This course has 6 assignments, and the 5 assignments with the highest marks are counted towards your final grade. Students are expected to submit each of the assignments by the deadline listed. For assessments submitted past the deadline, a late penalty of 25% per day will be applied.
