Course Description: Students who intend to pursue a degree in Actuarial Science, Applied Mathematics, Astronomy, Mathematics, Physics, or Statistics should take this course. Techniques of integration; The Mean Value Theorem and its consequences; series, Taylor series with applications; parametric and polar curves with applications; first order linear and separable differential equations with applications.

Course Assessments: Making up the students' grades will be in-class quizzes accounting for a total of 30% of the course grade, homework assignments worth 20% of the grade, and a final exam worth the remaining 50% of the grade. The final exam will be scheduled by the Registrars office and will be announced later.

Textbook: Copies of the following textbooks have been orderd for the course and are available at the UWO Bookstore. They are required for readings and practice problems.

Prerequisites: A minimum mark of 60% in one of Calculus 1000A/B, 1500A/B or the former 1100A/B.

What Is Expected Of The Student: The aim of the course is to continue the more rigorous treatment of calculus that began in 1500. This will require a considerable effort on your part. For each hour of lecture, you should spend about 2 hours studying the material at home. Due to the pace of the course being dictated by the lectures, it is highly recommended that you attend every class.

Remember, you understand the course material if you can answer new questions about it. Being able to answer similar questions repeatedly just shows that you remember a formula and being able to reproduce results from class only demonstrates memorization. While these are certainly important, you should not confuse them with a true understanding of the concepts.

In addition, students are expected to abide by the course and university policies and to maintain a healthy environment of respect and openness.

## Course Policies:

- With regards to e-mails being sent to the professor or other students, remember to be respectful of the other party and to use appropriate language in your correspondence. E-mails to the professor will receive a response within a span of two days, barring any extreme circumstances such as health.
