# Mathematics 3020A-001 Course Outline (Fall 2020-21) Introduction to Abstract Algebra

# **1. Course Delivery**

The class will be divided into two groups according to the first letter of their surname. Each group is invited to attend one of two optional in-person classes per week as shown in the following table:

Surname	Time	Location

M-Z	9:30-10:30 am on Thursdays	MC 105B

Due to physical distancing restrictions, students may *not* attend *both* in-person classes. In-person attendance is otherwise optional. Students not in physical attendance will be invited to join the in-person classes via Zoom. The class notes for both days will be posted on the OWL course website. Additional asynchronous materials will also be posted on the course website.

## 4. Course Syllabus

This course is an introduction to modern algebra. The subject starts by noticing that addition and multiplication make sense for more than just the integers: we are comfortable with these operations on rational, real, and complex numbers, as well as on polynomials. How about matrices? When is division defined? When does it make sense to talk about factorization? A systematic look at what's going on here turns out to be a gateway to modern mathematics. Along the way, we see how to understand symmetry, via the notion of groups.

Topics include:

- numbers and polynomials
- binary operations and useful axioms
- rings and ideals
- factorization questions
- introduction to field theory
- introduction to groups

### **5. Course Materials**

#### 6. Methods of Evaluation

**Evaluation**: five assignments (10% each), one 25% take-home midterm exam, one 25% take-home final exam.

**Exam dates**: to be announced.

**Missed assignments and exams**: If you miss an assignment or exam due to medical or non-medical reasons, you must contact your faculty's Academic Counselling Office, as soon as possible, to apply for accommodation. # 7. Accommodation and Accessibility

#### Academic Consideration for Student Absence

Students will have up to two (2) opportunities during the regular academic year to use an on-line portal to self-report an absence during the semester, provided the following conditions are met: the absence is no more than 48 hours in duration, and the assessment for which consideration is being sought is worth 30% or less of the student's final grade. Students are expected to contact their instructors within 24 hours of the end of the period of the self-reported absence, unless noted on the syllabus. Students are not able to use the self-reporting option in the following circumstances:

- for exams scheduled by the Office of the Registrar (e.g., December and April exams)
- absence of a duration greater than 48 hours,
- assessments worth more than 30% of the student's final grade,
- if a student has already used the self-reporting portal twice during the academic year

If the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence are *not* met, students will need to provide a Student Medical Certificate if the absence is medical, or provide appropriate documentation if there are compassionate grounds for the absence in question. Students are encouraged to contact their Faculty academic counselling office to obtain more information about the relevant documentation.

Students should also note that individual instructors are not permitted to receive documentation directly from a student, whether in support of an application for consideration on medical grounds, or for other reasons. All documentation required for absences that are not covered by the Self-Reported Absence Policy must be submitted to the Academic Counselling office of a student's Home Faculty.
