Prerequisite: (i) Mathematics 1600A/B; Applied Mathematics 2402A; Calculus 2303A/B or Calculus 2503A/B; or (ii) Calculus 2402A/B and Statistical Sciences 2503A/B. In each of the above courses, a minimum mark of 60% is required.

— Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

Textbook: J. David Logan, Applied Partial Differential Equations, 3rd edition, Springer 2015

— (i) This is the same text used last year for this course and it is available for free as an e-book from Western Libraries. (ii) Some materials not included in this text may be added to the course (so, skipping classes may result in disadvantageous consequences).

Course Topics: Boundary value problems for Laplace, heat, and wave equations; derivation of equations; separation of variables; Fourier series; Sturm-Liouville Theory; eigenfunction expansions; cylindrical and spherical problems; Fourier and Laplace transforms.

Course Evaluation: Assignments: (15%); Midterm exam (35%); Final exam (50%):

- 1) The main purpose of **assignments** is to push you to digest the course materials by doing exercises. Thus, the assignments are only given a very small percentage (15 %) toward the final grade. Problems will be assigned, and completed assignments will be collected and marked *partially and selectively only though*. Due times for handing in assignments will be strictly followed. Copying other people's assignments is now allowed; and if an copying is identified, penalty will be implemented.
- 2) Midterm exam will be on Monday, October 25 at 7:00-9:00pm, and the room(s) will be announced later. If for a reason acceptable by the university's policy, you have to miss the midterm or final exam, you need to obtain a permission from your Dean's office and I have to be notified of the permission in advance. Only when these are followed, the missed midterm will be accommodated either by reweighing or by writing a make-up, depending on the situation.
- 3) **Final exam** will be scheduled by the university's registrar's office. Also see **A1** in the Addendum below for other issues related to final exam.
- 4) In both midterm and final examinations, no electronic devices, including calculators and cell phones, are allowed.

A1. Student Absences.

Academic Consideration for Student Absences.

Students who experience an extenuating circumstance (illness, injury or other extenuating circumstance) sufficiently significant to temporarily render them unable to meet academic requirements may submit a request for academic consideration through the following routes:

- (i) Submitting a Self-Reported Absence (SRA) form provided that the conditions for submission are met. To be eligible for a Self-Reported Absence:
 - $-\,$ an absence must be no more than 48 hours
 - the assessments must be worth no more than 30% of the student?s final grade
 - no more than two SRAs may be submitted during the Fall/Winter term
- (ii) For medical absences, submitting a Student Medical Certificate (SMC) signed by a licensed medical or mental health practitioner to the Academic Counselling office of their Faculty of Registration.
- (iii) Submitting appropriate documentation for non-medical absences to the Academic Counselling office in their Faculty of Registration.

Note that in all cases, students are required to contact their instructors within 24 hours of the end of the period covered, unless otherwise instructed in the course outline.

Students should also note that individual instructors are not permitted to receive documentation directly from a student, whether in support of an application for consideration on medical grounds, or for other reasons. All documentation required for absences that are not covered by the Self-Reported Absence Policy must be submitted to the Academic Counselling office of a student's Home Faculty.

The maximum course load for that term will be reduced by the credit of the course(s) for which the final examination has been deferred.
