1. Course Information

AM2811b --- Applied Linear Algebra II (Winter 2023). Lecture (001): Mon-Wed-Fri, 9:30-10:30pm; in-person in room HSB-40.

Prerequisites: (Numerical and Mathematical Methods 1411A/B) or the former Applied Mathematics 1411A/B, or Mathematics 1600A/B) and (Numerical and Mathematical Methods 1414A/B) or Calculus 1301A/B or Calculus 1501A/B, or the former Applied Mathematics 1413 or the former Applied Mathematics 1414A/B). Integrated Science 1001X with a minimum mark of 60% can be used in place of Calculus 1301A/B.

Unless you have either the prerequisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

Course topics: Vector space, inner products, orthogonal sets including trigonometric functions, Graham-Schmidt process, orthogonal projections, least squares, normal equations, quadratic forms and quadratic functions and their extrema., Fourier approximations, eigenvalue problems, diagonalization, defective matrices, coupled difference and differential equations, singular value decomposition, image approximations, linear transformations. Applications to the sciences and other areas will be an integral part of the course.

<u>Course outcomes</u>: Students should be able to understand all those notions in the course description, do the related calculations and reasonings that involve these notions and use these notions and computations skills learned to solve some practical problems such as interpolations by data and minimization/maximation of quadratic functions etc.

Delivery model: classes and exams will all be in-person.

Classes end: 10 April 2023 Exam period: 12 – 30 April, 2023

Textbook: Peter J. Olver and Chehrzad Shakiban, Applied Linear Algebra, 2nd edition, Springer, New York, 2018.

Some materials not included in this text may be adopted/added and will be testable in the midterm or final exam. As such, skipping classes may result in disadvantageous consequences.

5. Methods of Evaluation

The overall course grade will be calculated as listed below:

Assignments 15% Dues to be announced as classes go

Midterm Test 35%. Wednesday March 1, 7:00-9:00pm (room to be announced later)

Final Exam 50% To be schedule by the registrar's office

<u>For assignments:</u> approximately there will be an **assignment** due every other week, with the exact due dates to be announced depending on the pacing. Problems will be assigned, and completed assignments will be collected and marked, partially and selectively only though. Due times for handing in assignments will be strictly followed.

<u>Midterm and final</u> will be in-person and close-book. No notes and electronic devices, including calculators and cell phones, are allowed. The <u>final exam</u> will be cumulative in contents, meaning that all materials in the whole semester may possibly be included in the final exam, although more weights will be given to the materials after the midterm.

6. Student Absences

If you are unable to meet a course requirement due to illness or other serious circumstances, please follow the procedures below.

Assessments worth less than 10% of the overall course grade:

If you miss the deadline of an assignment due to an unexpected incidence that can be convincingly justified, I may consider either extending the deadline to a reasonable new one, or allocating the weight of that assignment to the rest if it is too late from the deadline.

Assessments worth totalling 10% or more of the overall course grade:

If you **miss a midterm**, you must provide valid medical or supporting documentation to the Academic Counselling Office of your Faculty of Registration as soon as possible. For further information, please consult the University's medical illness policy at

Absences from Final Examinations:

If you **miss the Final Exam**, please contact the Academic Counselling office of your Faculty of Registration as soon as you are able to do so. They will assess your eligibility to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam), which will be scheduled later (usually tin he first week of May).

You may also be eligible to write the Special Exam if you are in a "Multiple Exam Situation" (e.g., more than 2 exams in 23-hour period, more than 3 exams in a 47-hour period).

If a student fails to write a scheduled Special Examination, the date of the next Special Examination (if granted) normally will be the scheduled date for the final exam the next time this course is offered. The maximum course load for that term will be reduced by the credit of the course(s) for which the final examination has been deferred. Note: missed work can *only* be excused through one of the mechanisms above. Being asked not to attend an in-person course requirement due to potential COVID-19 symptoms is **not** sufficient on its own.
