- The course will be based on the textbook *Multivariable Calculus*, 9th ed., by J. Stewart. (required). The PDF version can be purchased from the editor. Student solution manual is recommended. Note: older editions of Stewart are not compatible with the current 9th edition.
- Some computer calculations and experimentations will be done using the computer algebra system SAGE that is available for free at https://www.sagemath.org.

Course Syllabus

Description from the Academic Calendar: Integral calculus of functions of several variables: multiple integrals; Leibnitz' rule; arc length; surface area; Green's theorem; independence of path; simply connected and multiply connected domains; three dimensional theory and applications; divergence theorem; Stokes' theorem.

Learning outcomes: The course material corresponds to Chapters 15 and 16 from your textbook. Time to time we shall also give extra examples and applications of concepts and results as we go through these two chapters. Advanced Calculus 1 was all about differentiating multivariable functions and vector fields. In Advanced Calculus 2 we shall learn how to integrate multivariable functions and vector fields and shall find the multivariable analogues of the fundamental theorem of calculus which relate differentiation to integration (theorems of Green, Gauss and Stokes). Other topics include: change of variable formula and Jacobians; integration in polar, cylindrical and spherical coordinates. Special attention will be given to precise definitions and theorems. Some computer calculations and experimentations will be done using the computer algebra system SAGE that is available for free at https://www.sagemath.org.

What is expected from the students

Students are expected to attend all class meetings, review all learning materials in timely fashion, follow class announcements, complete all assignments and write all examinations. Solutions of assignments problems must be written neatly, and handed in by the deadline. Problem sets will be distributed regularly for self assessment. They will not be marked, but partial solutions will be provided for selected problems.

Methods of Evaluation

The overall course grade will be calculated as listed below. Note that the given dates **are only tentative** and are waiting final approval.

- Assignment #1: 10%, due 2023-02-05, 23:59.
- Midterm Test: 30%, 2023-02-15, 19:00 21:00.
- Assignment #2: 10%, due 2022-03-12, 23:59.
- Assignment #3: 10%, due 2022-04-02, 23:59.
- Final Exam: 40%, 3 hours, sheduled by OOR during the exam week.

Assignments will be submitted online through **Gradescope**.

If needed, a makeup midterm will be held **one week** after the midterm (± 1 day if necessary). Note that **cellphones**, **calculators**, **cheat sheets**, **textbooks**, **and any other aids will NOT** be allowed during examinations.

Student Absences and Missed Evaluation Components

They will assess your eligibility to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam).

Note: missed work can only be excused through one of the mechanisms above. Being asked not to attend an in-person course requirement due to potential COVID-19 symptoms is not sufficient on its own.
