3 Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

Course Description: An introduction to the theory of groups. Topics covered (time permitting): cyclic, dihedral, symmetric, alternating; subgroups, quotient groups, homomorphisms, cosets, Lagrange's theorem, isomorphism theorems; group actions, class equation, p-groups, Sylow theorems; direct and semidirect products, wreath products, finite abelian groups; Jordan-Hölder theorem, commutator subgroup, solvable and nilpotent groups; free groups, generators and relations.

Learning Outcomes:

- Demonstrate the ability to verify whether a set with a binary operation forms a group.
- Be able to rigorously justify claims about groups by relying on precise definitions and theorem statements.
- Construct examples and non-examples of groups which exhibit a given set of properties.
- State and apply standard theorems about groups (LaGrange's theorem, isomorphism theorems, Cayley's theorem, Sylow theorems, etc)

Federico Ardilla's Axioms:

- Axiom 1. Mathematical potential is distributed equally among different groups, irrespective of geographic, demographic, and economic boundaries.
- Axiom 2. Everyone can have joyful, meaningful, and empowering mathematical experiences.
- Axiom 3. Mathematics is a powerful, malleable tool that can be shaped and used differently by various

communities to serve their needs.

• Axiom 4. Every student deserves to be treated with dignity and respect.


