Differentiation, the Mean Value Theorem, and integration. Metric spaces, including topology, convergence, compactness, completeness, and connectedness. Uniform convergence of functions. Selected additional topics.

recall and apply theorems about differentiation and integration of functions;

extend the use of the basic concepts of analysis from the real line to the metric spaces;

identify uniformly convergent sequences.

Assignments [30%]: There will be five assignments, each worth 6%. The due dates are Wednesdays Sept. 20, Oct. 4, Oct. 25, Nov. 22, Dec. 6.

*Midterm Tests* [30%]: There will be two in class tests. The dates are Wednesdays Oct. 18 and Nov. 15. Each test is 50 min long and is worth 15 %.

*Final Exam* [40%] The Final Exam will be scheduled by the Registrar during the Exam Period. The duration is 2hrs. The exam is cumulative.

### **Assessments Worth Less Than 10% of Course Grade**

The mechanism for dealing with missed course work worth strictly less than 10% of the total course grade, i.e. a missed homework assignment, will be as follows. The student needs to advise the instructor as soon as possible of the missed assignment. *One* missed assignment will be forgiven, there is no need to contact the academic counsellors, and the 30% homework grade component will be reweighted, with the missed assignment omitted and the 30% grade component based on the remaining four homework sets. *Two or more* missed assignments will trigger a referral of the student to the Academic Counselling Office of their Faculty of Registration for an academic consideration request and the appropriate accommodation will be decided in consultation with the academic counselling.

### **Assessments Worth At Least 10% of Course Grade**
