3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

Course Description: Automorphisms of fields, separable and normal extensions, splitting fields, fundamental theorem of Galois theory, primitive elements, Lagrange's theorem. Finite fields and their Galois groups, cyclotomic extensions and polynomials, applications of Galois theory to geometric constructions and solution of algebraic equations.

Learning Outcomes: By the end of the course you will be able to:

- Reproduce the basic definitions related to field theory
- Articulate the difference between an algebraic extension and a transcendental extension
- Calculate a primitive element of an algebraic extension as well as its degree
- Determine whether an extension is simple, normal, separable, or Galois
- Calculate the Galois group of a polynomial
- Work out explicit examples illustrating the Galois correspondence
- Determine if a polynomial is solvable by radicals

Lecture Schedule: We will aim to cover a section in the textbook every two class periods. The class will cover Chapters 13 and 14 of Dummit & Foote (15 sections).

Quiz Schedule: Quizzes will be given weekly on Mondays with few exceptions (see Section 5)

Homework Schedule: Homework will be due weekly on Fridays, with few exceptions (see Section 5)
