3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

Course description:

Functions of multiple variables and their differential calculus. The gradient and the Hessian. Constrained and unconstrained optimization of scalar-valued functions of many variables: Lagrange multipliers. Multidimensional Taylor series. Integrating scalar-valued functions of several variables: Jacobian transformations. Pointwise and uniform convergence. Power series.

Course-level learning outcomes: on successful completion of this course, students will be able to

Recall and apply theorems about functions of several real variables,

Explain the significance of partial derivatives and directional derivatives,

Demonstrate skills in optimization techniques,

Perform calculations with integrals and series

Indicate basic properties of pointwise and uniform convergence

All Academic Consideration requests must include supporting documentation; however, recognizing that formal documentation may not be available in some extenuating circumstances, the policy allows students to make <u>one</u> Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** in this course. However, the following assessments are excluded from this, and therefore always require formal supporting documentation:

- Examinations scheduled during official examination periods (Defined by policy)
- Midterm 2 (Designated by the instructor as the <u>one</u> assessment that always requires documentation when requesting Academic Consideration)
- Homework assignments (Per policy; due to flexibility in the submission timeframe: a 2 week submission window)

When a student <u>mistakenly</u> submits their <u>one</u> allowed Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** for the assessments listed above or those in the **Coursework with Assessment Flexibility** section below, <u>the request cannot be recalled and reapplied</u>. This privilege is forfeited.

Evaluation Scheme for Missed Assessments

Each missed assessment that is not followed up in a timely manner by an academic consideration request (that is subsequently approved), will result in the grade of zero for this assessment. Missed assignments: extensions will not be granted. Late papers will not be accepted after the assignment solutions are released. For students with approved accommodation, appropriate reweighting will be done. Missed midterm test: a student with approved accommodation will be given one chance to write a make up test, within two weeks of the original test. If the make up test is not written within 2 weeks and there is an approved accommodation covering that, then the mark will be moved to the final exam.

When a student misses the Final Exam and their Academic Consideration has been granted, they will be allowed to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam). See the Academic Calendar for details (under <u>Special Examinations</u>), especially for those who miss multiple final exams within one examination period.
