Prerequisite(s): Computer Science 1026A/B or Engineering Science 1036A/B, in each case with at least 60%, and 1.0 courses with at least 60% in each from: Numerical and Mathematical Methods 1411A/B or the former Applied Mathematics 1411A/B, Numerical and Mathematical Methods 1412A/B or the former Applied Mathematics 1412A/B, Numerical and Mathematical Methods 1414A/B or the former Applied Mathematics 1414A/B, or the former Applied Mathematics 1413.

Unless students have either the prerequisites for this course or written special permission from the Department of Mathematics to enroll in it, they may be removed and withdrawn from this course in accordance with university policy. This may be done after the add/drop deadline of the academic term, and the course will be marked as withdrawn (WDN) on their academic record. This decision may not be appealed.

This course covers logic, mathematical reasoning, sets and functions, relations, properties of integers and congruence, counting techniques, and introductory graph theory.

At the end of the course a successful student will be able to:

- Analyze the validity of logical statements and logical arguments via truth tables.
- Manipulate and simplify logical statements, and compute the disjunctive normal form.
- Write proofs of logical/mathematical statements, including proofs by induction.
- Establish the validity of a mathematical argument.
- Effectively use the language of sets and their operations, and give precise definitions and examples of equivalence relations, and order relations, and functions.
- Assess the truth of and prove elementary statements about sets, relations, functions.
- Define congruence classes of integers, and use modular arithmetic.
- State Fermat's little theorem and Sunzi's theorem (a.k.a. the Chinese remainder theorem), and explain their relevance to cryptography.
- Use different counting tools such as combinations, permutations and the balls and walls method to solve counting problems.
- Understand graphs and establish basic properties such as planarity, and existence of Euler circuits and Hamiltonian paths, and cycles.

Use of Generative AI Tools

The wide majority of your grade in this course (95%) will be determined by in-class assessment, where AI tools will not be allowed. For the homework assignments, which make up 5% of your grade, my tentative policy is that asking a chat bot X is considered cheating if asking another student X is also considered cheating. For example, asking another student to help you understand proofs by induction is allowed, but asking another student to do your homework for you is not. I ask that you adhere to the same standard with chat bots. There is a lot of grey area here, but then again, there always has been. You know when you're learning and when you're not, and I will try as best I can to avoid putting pressure on you to use AI instead of thinking for yourself. In the first few classes, we will talk more about academic honesty, working on assignments in groups, how to ask for help, etc.

Information about Missed Coursework

All requests for Academic Consideration on the final exam must be made within 48 hours after the assessment date or submission deadline.

Midterm and Final exams

This course has two midterm tests and a **cumulative** final exam. There is no makeup test for a missed midterm. If a student misses a midterm, its weight will shift automatically to their final exam grade. If their final exam grade is higher than their midterm grade, their final exam grade will replace the midterm's weight in their overall grade. They do not need to request Academic Consideration for a missed midterm; the reweighing will be done automatically.

The only exception is an early sitting, offered solely for a university-sanctioned schedule conflict (e.g., conflict of two midterms, Varsity competitions) or a religious accommodation that prevents a student from writing the midterm at its scheduled time. If a student requires this accommodation, they must notify their instructor in writing no later than one week before the test. No other circumstance, including illness, qualifies for an early sitting or makeup; these are addressed through the automatic reweighing described above.

Homework Assignments

This course has 12 homework assignments, which will be graded on the basis of completeness and displayed effort. Students are expected to complete 9/12 to receive full credit for this component. If they miss up to 3 of these, they do not need to request Academic Consideration; the missing items will not count against them, and their grade for this component will be calculated from their best 9 submissions.

Quizzes

This course also has 12 quizzes, each of which covers one homework assignment. The policy for quizzes will be the same as for homework. Students' grades for this component will be calculated from their best 9/12 submissions.

If a student completes fewer than 9 of the homeworks or quizzes, the missing items will be recorded as a zero and included in their grade for this component. They are encouraged to submit all work, even if incomplete, since a partial mark is always better than a zero. If their final exam grade is higher than their grade on this component, their final exam grade will replace it.

Deadlines: The 48-Hour No-Late-Penalty Period

All homework assignments include an automatic 48-hour period after the deadline during which students may still submit without a late penalty. For example, if an assignment is due on November 5, they may submit it until November 7 without penalty. After this 48-hour period, no further submissions will be accepted, and students do not need to request Academic Consideration for a missed deadline; their grade for this component will be calculated as described above.

Special Examination

Per university policy, Academic Consideration requests with supporting documentation are required for the final examinations scheduled during official examination periods by the Registrar's Office.

If the student has been approved by the Academic Advising Office to write a Special Examination (SPC) and the final exam is their only outstanding course component, an SPC will be assigned to them and scheduled by the instructor per university policy.

If the student misses their SPC exam and is approved for Academic Consideration, they will be withdrawn from the course without academic penalty. If they experienced extenuating circumstances such as prolonged illness, they may appeal to the Associate Dean (Academic), on a case-by-case basis, for the opportunity to write the final exam the next time the course is offered. An outstanding SPC will reduce their course load for the term in which the exam is deferred, as outlined in the [Definitions of Types of Examinations](#) policy.

If the student misses their SPC exam and Academic Consideration is not approved, or was not requested, they will receive a grade of zero on the exam.

6. Additional Statements

6.1 Religious Accommodation

When a recognized religious holiday either requires a student to be absent from the University, or requires or prohibits an activity that makes it impossible for them to complete an academic requirement scheduled that day, they are entitled to accommodation. No student will be penalized for an absence for religious reasons, and an alternative means of satisfying the requirement will be arranged. The student should submit their requests through the Student Absence Portal (SAP), identifying the conflict and the specific course component(s) affected (e.g., test, midterm, exam).

Midterms and Tests: If a religious observance conflicts with a midterm test, they must submit their request no later than **one week** before the test. Their instructor will arrange an early sitting of the test. As set out above, no makeup test is offered for any other reason; this early sitting is available specifically for this accommodation.

Final Examinations: If a religious observance conflicts with the final exam, the student must submit their request no later than **two weeks** before the exam. Their instructor will arrange a Special Examination to take place no later than one month after the end of the examination period.

Students are responsible for finding out what was covered in any class they miss due to a religious observance, and for taking the appropriate steps to keep up with the course.

If a suitable arrangement cannot be reached between a student and their instructor, they should consult the Undergraduate Chair of the department offering the course, and if necessary, the Associate Dean (Academic) of the Faculty of Science.

Use of Electronic Devices During Assessments

In courses offered by the Faculty of Science, the **possession** of unauthorized electronic devices during any in-person assessment (such as tests, midterms, and final examinations) is strictly prohibited. Effective September 2026, the typical penalty for this offence is a failing grade in the course AND a 12-month prohibition on retaking the course.

Only devices expressly permitted by the instructor (e.g., non-programmable calculators) may be brought into the assessment room. It is their responsibility to review and comply with these expectations.

Use of Generative AI Tools
